#### Greetings,

In many ways, this isn't the newsletter I expected to send this spring. The pandemic has changed life for all of us; it has altered our plans, tested our resolve, and forced us to cope with many kinds of loss. At the same time, we continue to reckon with police brutality and anti-Black injustice, simultaneously grieving and showing up for our neighbors. As we enter into Pride month amidst so much upheaval, I'm reflecting on the Stonewall Riots of 1969. The events at Stonewall changed the trajectory of the LGBTQ+ liberation movement, building on the sacrifices and gains of the Civil Rights Movement. Black lives matter and, as an organization with predominantly White leadership, we are aware that we need to be explicit about our anti-racism, mindful of our impact, and unwavering in our commitment to serving Black queer and transgender youth.

Through these intertwined events, our goal is to be a safe haven for young people. LGBTQ+ youth often deal with rejection or lack of understanding at home, and these youth need us now more than ever. Since mid-March, all of our programs have been fully online, allowing youth to access support virtually three times each week. Because of you, they remain connected to one another and to supportive adult role models, and it is clearly making a difference. Program attendance is strong, and we've been heartened by the power of engaging across distance.

So while this newsletter is different than the one I'd imagined writing, you'll find that, like you, we're forging new paths to activism, connection, and community. Our educational workshops have made a seamless transition to the virtual realm, we're hosting chats with alums home unexpectedly from college, and this week we are welcoming aboard our next executive director. You can read about her below, and she is looking forward to meeting you soon!

I hope that you and your loved ones are feeling supported and finding the resources you need at this time. If you aren't, please tell me how we can help. And as we head into Pride month, I'm sharing a few opportunities to be part of our community's joy. If these are activities that would bring light to your life, I hope you'll take part.

<u>Here's to our resilience, our collective liberation, and to the youth who will shape</u> our future!
